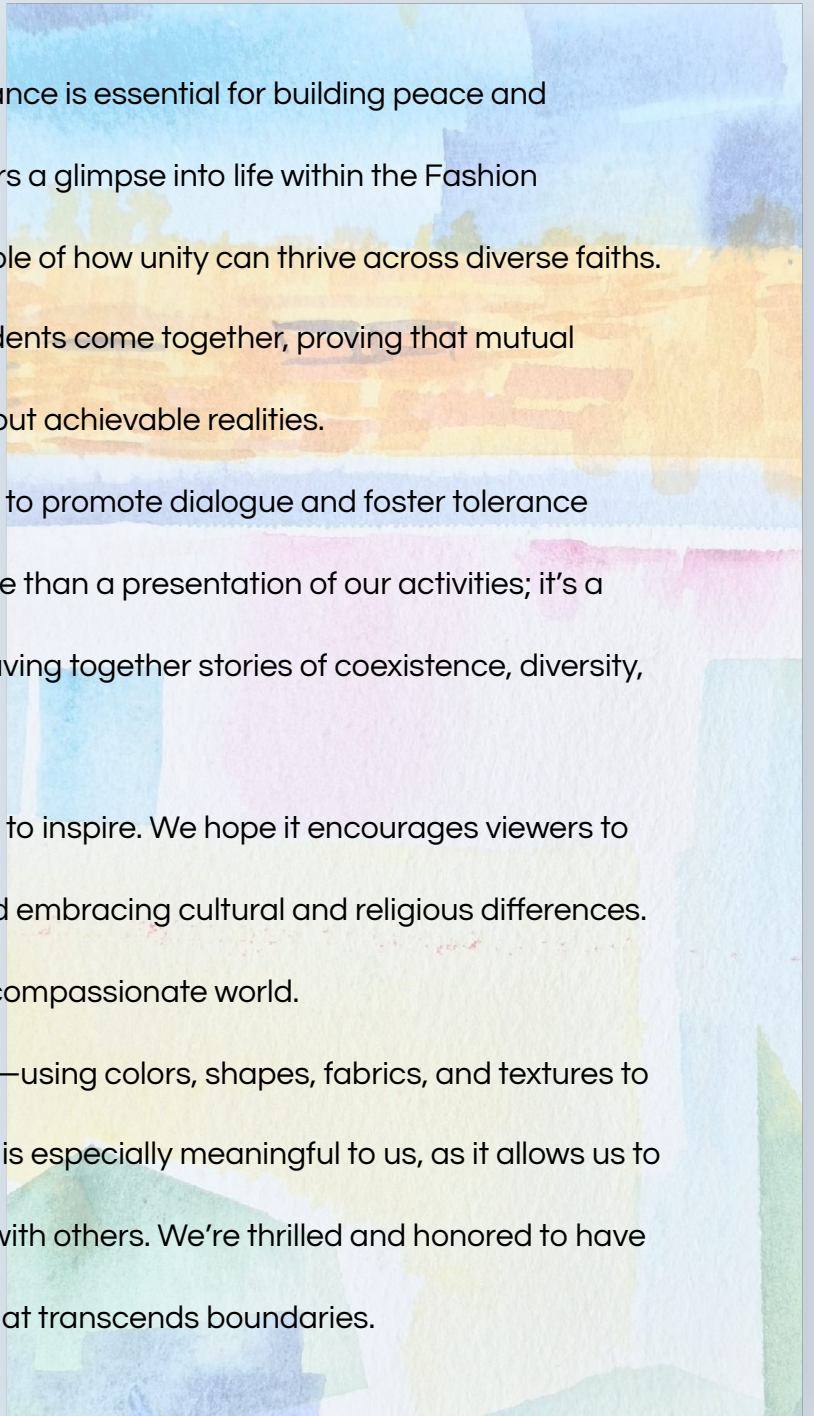
# INTRODUCTION

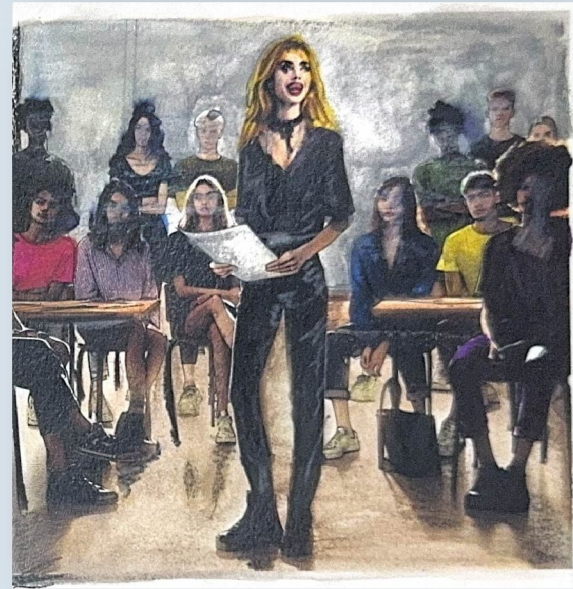

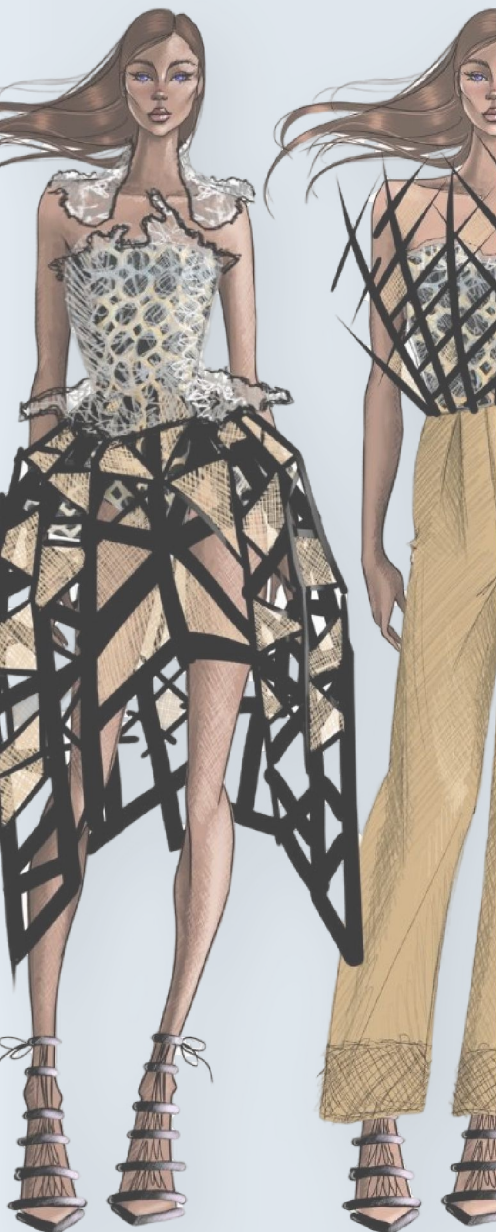
## Religious Diversity and Freedom in Fashion

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
## Conclusion
